

### City Seeks Easement in Park for Sewer Line

The City of Norton Shores has asked for an easement through the neighborhood park to install a new sewer line.

The gravity-fed sewer would allow the city to remove the lift station on upper Norcrest Drive near the park entrance, said David Geyer, water and sewer superintendent. The city must send a crew and a generator to that lift station during every power outage to prevent sewage backups into nearby homes; it's one of more than 40 such lift stations in the city, Mr. Geyer said.

The requested easement would follow the path of the sidewalk into the park from upper Norcrest to the tennis court, then continue straight west across the tennis court and through the woods to the west edge of the park. At that point, it would connect to an existing sewer line, Mr. Geyer said.

Orange stakes in the park indicate roughly the center of the proposed easement. About 25 trees west of the tennis court marked with orange X's would be removed; only six of those trees are larger than a few

inches in diameter.

The initial request is for a 20-foot-wide easement. Much of that width is needed to allow equipment to maneuver, and the channel dug for the sewer would be narrower, Mr. Geyer said.

If the easement is granted, work would likely not begin until spring, Mr. Geyer said. The city would restore the park to good condition after the work, including repaving the entire sidewalk and half the tennis court, replacing the concrete pad for the picnic table, and repairing any other damage, he said.

The city also would plant new trees in the woods, but Mr. Geyer acknowledged that they would be small – probably 3- to 4-foot blue spruce, he said.

Residents on the south side of upper Norcrest would be allowed to hook up to the new sewer at their own expense if they want to, but would not be required to do so, he said.

We will discuss the requested easement at our annual meeting Sept. 26.

### Board Asks for 'Speed Hump' to Slow Traffic on Dunes

The city took some action this summer to try to make Dunes Parkway safer, but your NHERA Board believes it was not enough.

City workers posted a new sign for northbound Dunes just south of our neighborhood, warning of a curve with an intersecting street. The Board appreciates that sign, but as we expected, it has done little to slow traffic. Workers also changed the yield sign on South Hilltop Drive to a stop sign, a change we opposed.

After the city rejected our second request for a stop sign for Dunes Parkway at South Hilltop, I spoke to the City Council about the problem and asked the council to approve a "speed hump" on Dunes, just south of South Hilltop.

A speed hump is not the same thing as a speed bump like those found in parking lots; traffic can cross a speed hump comfortably at 25 to 27 mph – at or just above the speed limit on Dunes. Much faster than that, though, and it gets uncomfortable.

A study for the Federal Highway Administration found that speed humps reduce speeds by an average of 7 mph, or 20 percent – more than any other measure intended to slow traffic.

Director of Public Works Gerald Bartoszek has prepared a report for the City Council on speed humps, including some design and siting standards used elsewhere, said City Administrator Mark Meyers.

Mr. Bartoszek's report does not make a recommendation either way on our request, Mr. Meyers said.

The council is expected to discuss the report and our request at its work session on Monday, Sept. 25; the public is invited. It's just one day before our annual meeting, but I'll be there, and I encourage all residents concerned about traffic safety in the neighborhood to attend. The meeting is set for 7 p.m. in the large conference room at City Hall, 4814 Henry St.

Current neighborhood residents have purchased the home site on the southeast corner of Dunes Parkway and Norcrest Drive.

They're awaiting closing later this month and asked not to be identified until the sale is final, but we know they'll make that home site look great because their current home looks great! They plan to build a smaller home on their new lot, but may wait a few years to begin.

The two lots on the northwest corner of the intersection remain for sale. One neighbor told the city he would make a "ridiculously low" offer on one lot but has not yet done so, said Community Development Director Dick Maher, adding that the city will consider the offer if it is made.

The city also received one tentative expression of interest from someone outside the neighborhood, but that person did not follow up, Mr. Maher said.

Mr. Maher said he still expects to put "For Sale" signs on those two lots if they don't sell soon.

Your neighborhood association will get \$250 from the sale of each lot. The NHERA Board thanks the city and Mr. Maher in particular for ensuring that all three lots were maintained over the summer.
